### **Kiddy Kollege**

Scouting is a family program. Kiddy Kollege will be available for families with younger children. Kiddy Kollege attendees must be at least 3 years old and POTTY TRAINED. There will be activities for your child(ren) while you attend training. You must pick up your child(ren) for lunch. Lunch is scheduled for Periods 3 and 4. Please let the Kiddy Kollege staff know which Period you will be taking your child(ren) to lunch.

If you participate in a class that is scheduled through both lunch periods, please make arrangements to have someone pick up and supervise your child(ren) at the lunch hour. For the safety of your child(ren), you must provide a name for any individuals other than parents that will be allowed to pick them up. THE KIDDY KOLLEGE STAFF WILL NOT HAVE RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO PROVIDE LUNCH FOR YOUR CHILD(REN). **Lunch is not provided.**

## **Cubmaster & Assistant Cubmaster Position Specific Training\***

**C40**                    **Periods 1-5** (5 Periods/4 1/2 hours)

This course is designed to outline the roles and responsibilities of the Cubmaster (Key 3 position) and Assistant Cubmasters for the Cub Scout program.

## **Cub Scout Den & Assistant leader Position Specific Training\***

**C42**                    **Periods 1-5** (5 Periods/4 1/2 hours)

This course is designed to convey the roles and responsibilities of the Den Leaders for all Cub Scout Programs, e.g., Lions, Tigers, Wolves, Bears and Webelos.

## **Pack Committee Challenge\***

**C60**                    **Period 1-4** (4 Periods/4 hours)

This course is designed to outline the roles and responsibilities of the Committee Chair (Key 3 position) and the Committee members for the Cub Scout Program.

## **Advisor & Associate Crew Advisor Venture Leader Specific Training\***

**P21**                    **Period 1-4** (4 Periods/4 hours)

This course is designed to convey the roles and responsibilities of the Advisor and Associate Crew Advisors for the Venturing Program.

## **Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster Specific Training**

**S24**                    **Periods 2-6** (4 periods/3 3/4 hours)

This course is designed to convey the roles and responsibilities of the Scoutmaster (Key 3 position) and Assistant Scoutmasters for the Scouts BSA Program. The completion of this course and the Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS S11) is required to earn the “trained” patch.

## **Troop Committee Challenge\***

**WS10**                    **Periods 2-6** (4 periods/3 3/4 hours)

This course is designed to outline the roles and responsibilities of the Committee Chair (Key 3 position) and the Committee members for the Scouts BSA Program.

## **Committee Chair & Crew Committee Member Specific Training\***

**WS12**                    **Periods 1-3** (3 Periods/2 1/4 hours)

This course is designed to outline the roles and responsibilities of the Committee Chair (Key 3 position) and the Committee members for the Venturing Program.

## **Merit Badge Counselor Orientation Training\***

**D76**                    **Period 6** (1 Period/1 hour)

This course is designed to outline the roles and responsibilities for Merit Badge Counselors within the Scouts BSA Program.

## **Chartered Organization Representative Training\***

**D72**                    **Period 7** (1 Period/1 hour)

This course is designed to convey the roles and responsibilities of the Chartered Organization Representative (Key 3 Position) for the Scouts BSA program.

**\*Completion of the course earns the “trained” patch.**

## Leader Specific Training

### **Commissioner Basic Training**

**ComBaT**      **Periods 4-7** (4 Periods 4 hours)

ComBaT Training will examine: What a Commissioner is; does; and how they do it. You will be given information to understand their unit service role in supporting units, understand the methods and steps of good unit program planning and be able to understand commissioner priorities and how to be an effective leader.

### **District Commissioner Training**

**ADC/DC**      **Periods 4-7** (4 Periods/4 Hours)

This course is for District Commissioners, Assistant District Commissioners, and other Scouters who are being appointed to one of these positions. Learn the mission of commissioner service; utilizing the Commissioner Tools on My.Scouting.org; how to be a leader versus manager; reading and using monthly commissioner reports; serving new units; recruiting, training and retaining commissioners; the importance of regular unit visits; and the commissioner's role in assisting their units to succeed in the Journey to Excellence.

**CCOF-5**      **Period 5**

Come talk to our Council Commissioner, Mark Zoller about any and all things Scouting.

This Scouting course meets the needs of Qualistar and the Colorado Health and Human Service's requirements for our Scout Medics to learn or review what is necessary to ensure safe and accurate administration of medications, including when and how to use an epi-pen, what to do in case of an allergic reaction or emergency, and an overview of asthma. The course enables you to be placed on the Qualistar list of certified unlicensed personnel with MedAmin Training.

- The certification is good for 3 years and only costs \$5
- Is taught by a Scouter/Advanced Practice Nurse with a Master's degree

#### Recruiting from Packs to Your Troop

**BS1-5**                    **Period 5**

Learn how to keep Webelos Scouts from becoming Scout dropouts. We will cover crossover ceremonies, building prospective troop relationships and attending Scouting outdoor programs. Choosing a troop is not the first decision in many cases, but may be the most important in defining their future Scouting success. Not every troop is right for every youth or family. The size, program, the style of leadership all have an affect on the choice.

Planning for and accommodating special diets so that everyone can cook and eat together.

# Continuing Education

## Special Needs

### Special Needs Awareness

#### **CE1-1            Period 1**

Informational class regarding Scouts with special needs and what resources are available to Scout leaders and units so that leaders and units are working together with Scouts who have special needs for a successful Scouting program for all.

### Special Needs Designation and Advancement Procedures

#### **CE1-2            Period 2**

For registered leaders and parents, learn how to designate a Scout with a disability as a Scout with special needs for all levels of Scouting. Learn how to apply for modified and/or alternative advancement procedures using the BSA Individual Scout Achievement Plan for older Scouts with special needs. Learn how to register for beyond the age of eligibility for a Scouts BSA or Venturer, with developmental disabilities or severe physical limitations. Handouts and check lists will be provided.

### Special Needs Scouting—ADHD

#### **CE1-3            Period 3**

Participants of this course will become familiar with the multiple characteristics common to Scouts who have ADD/ADHD and with easy tips to help them to get the most out of the Scouting program.

### Special Needs Scouting—Autism

#### **CE1-5            Period 5**

Participants of the course will become familiar with the multiple characteristics common to individuals who have Autism Spectrum Disorder and with easy tips to help them to get the most out of the Scouting Program.

## This and That

### Family Scouting Recruiting—Best Practices, Tips and Tricks

#### **CE2-1            Period 1**

This course will focus on recruiting best practices for units under the new Family Scouting structure, including discussion of recommendations tips and tricks for units to best recruit new members. Do your part to help give every youth in Denver an opportunity to join Scouting.

### Generations in Scouting

#### **E2-2            Period 2**

What is a generation? Diversity, cultural differences, impact to groups. Learn ways to work together across generations for a better future.

### Camp Gadgets

#### **CE2-3            Period 3**

Gadgets (devices) make camping life easier. A few examples of commonly found “gadgets” are given to start. Then participants add their suggestions of, and recommendations for, their favorite gadgets.

# Continuing Education

## **Toward More Nutritious Camp Meals**

**CE2-5                      Period 5**

Discussion of food and nutritional groups; use of Food Pyramids, My Plate and Nutritional Facts panels to teach Scouts of all ages to improve meal quality. Includes food allergies and the Top 10 list of things not to do when preparing food. Learn how to establish an effective menu planning and shopping program in your unit.

## **Camping Food Safety and Sanitation**

**CE2-6                      Period 6**

Course covers food handling mistakes, refrigeration techniques, dishware cleaning and sanitizing, hand washing, foodborne illness and food allergies, “animal proofing” the campsite, water purification and more.

## **Outdoor Ethics**

### **Leave No Trace 101**

**CE3-1                      Period 1-3**

This class is designed to help youth and adults at all program levels to understand the Seven Principles of Leave NO Trace and how to apply them in the BSA outdoor program. This is a good course for Scouts serving as their troop’s Outdoor Ethics Guide and adults serving and the Outdoor Ethics Guide Advisor.

### **Outdoor Ethics Orientation**

**CE3-5                      Period 5**

Learn about the Outdoor Code, Leave No Trace, Tread Lightly!, and the Land Ethic in this short intro to Outdoor Ethics. This session will give a basic understanding of the BSA Outdoor Ethics program, the Outdoor Ethics Guide troop position of responsibility, and the Outdoor Ethics Awareness and Action awards.

### **Female Bodies in the Backcountry—Presented by a former Philmont Ranger**

**CE3-7                      Period 7**

A discussion of hygiene, techniques, outdoor ethics, youth protection and the emotional and mental barriers people (young and old, male and female) have to enjoying the outdoors. Both men and women are welcome to attend.

## **First Aid**

### **Stop the Bleed!**

**CE4-1                      Period 1**

This is a one hour advanced bleeding control training following AHA guidelines. Includes practicals in tourniquet use, compression wraps, hemostatic dressings and others.

### **Allergic Reactions in the Wilderness Setting**

**CE4-2                      Period 2**

Pre-trip planning, med forms, medication use, emergency treatment.

# Continuing Education

## **Basic First Aid and CPR**

**CE4-47**                      **Periods 4-7**

(Class fee of \$40 will be collected on-site, bring cash)
